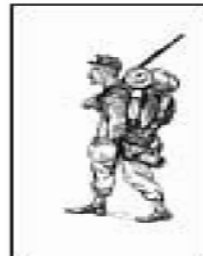

SPECIAL FIELD ORDER No.4.  
HDQRS. Union (Iverson's) Division. , Dept. of Southern Calif.,  
Los Angeles, California, January 16, 1863.

To Officer Commanding the Infantry, Cavalry and Artillery Brigades, Union Division

**Safety Stand Down**  
**14 February 2009 at 0800**  
**Calico, California**

**Why a Safety Stand Down?** The ACWS has had two incidents in this reenacting year involving foreign objects being fired from weapons. One at Calico and one at Acton II; both incidents involved individuals being hit by a foreign object fired from a weapon. Both individuals received severe bruises from being hit. *We can all agree that any injury is unacceptable and that we are lucky that these injuries could have been much more severe. This Safety Stand Down is to help insure that future accidents do not occur.*

**What is a Safety Stand down?** A Safety Stand Down is conducted whenever there are indicators of safety complacency or a severe safety incident has occurred. A Safety Down means all activities cease except for the activities being conducted as part of the safety review. All Combatants are required to attend; civilians are highly encouraged to attend. The Safety Stand Down centers on the indicators or incident and is oriented on awareness, correction and safe practices.

The Safety Stand Down will occur at the Union Division Headquarters, at 0800 on 14 February 2009. Everyone's cooperation in accomplishing this mission is greatly appreciated.

SPECIAL FIELD ORDER No. 5.  
HDQRS. ACWS Union Division. , DEPT. OF Southern Calif.,  
Las Angeles, California, January 20, 1863.

To Officer Commanding the Infantry, Cavalry and Artillery Brigades, Union Division

After the break in the weather this winter, it has been reported by the Nevada District Commander that a large contingent of Confederates, at least Brigade strength, is moving on the Southern California mining town of Calico. If the Confederates gain control of this mining area, funds desperately needed by the States currently in rebellion become available and funneled to weapons and other purchases. The Union cannot allow this to happen. The Secretary of War has ordered the Union Division located in Southern California to recall its forces currently engaged in areas around Southern California. The Commander is to consolidate these forces and move as soon as practical. All Commanders in the Union Division are hereby ordered to immediately recall all patrols and units currently garrisoning towns in the Southern California area. All units must report to the Union (Iverson's) Division and be prepared to move on this order no later than 14 February 1863 at 0800. All commanders are to follow these directives:

1. Report not later than 1 February 1863 your unit's ability to arrive at Calico and in what numbers. This report will include:
  - a. Unit, Unit commanders name and number of combatants.
  - b. Number of military non combatants.
  - c. Number of Civilians anticipated to follow the Division.
  - d. Number and type of tentage so space can be allocated. Normal unit setups will have to be adjusted and commanders should consider that now. If commanders don't respond, space will not be planned for you and you will get whats left over, which may be nothing. WALL TENTS ARE NOT ALLOWED FOR THIS EVENT. Space is limited. Units should seriously consider doubling up their folks. Units call however, commanders will have to fit into space allocated. If your unit has made other lodging arrangements, the commander needs to know that also.
2. No unit is to sink a single stake in the ground until directed by the Adjutant where your unit is to set up. If you fail to follow this directive, you may be told take down

whatever you have set up and move. The simple way would be to wait for the Adjutant who plans to be at Calico as early as he can. The Adjutant plans and makes maps based of what he receives from units.

3. This is an ACWS member event only! Cards will be checked by commanders in camp and they will also be checked at formations. No one will take the field that cannot show ACWS membership.
4. Safety is paramount at this event, battle areas are tight and congested – and is a leaders responsibility that can not be delegated. Yes, individuals are ultimately responsible for their own individual safety; However, it is the leader who is ultimately responsible for the actions and safety of their unit, on and off the field. We've started a new year and as always things is a changing. Unit commanders will ensure that all their members have taken the general safety test and the safety test specific to their branch. The Division Commander and/or his designated representative have the authority to remove unsafe reenactors and/or units from the field based solely on his judgment.
5. Unit commanders will bring a roster of their unit who has successfully passed the safety tests to Captain Crichton, Adjutant, Union Division with the first morning report on Saturday 16 February.
6. There will be a Division Guard force for Saturday and Sunday nights. The Adjutant will designate a Sergeant of the Guard for both nights, and each unit will provide soldiers for this is a rotating duty. All units are expected to participate. Failure to participate could be grounds for the Division Commander to restrict the offending unit from taking the field the next day.
7. The Adjutant is responsible for designating the Color Guard and the raising and lowering of the National Colors Saturday thru Monday. Your unit should also be prepared to provide Soldiers for the Color Guard. White gloves is required, all Soldiers should have white gloves.
8. The first battle on Saturday is where the Union moves on Calico to push the rebels out. This fight will be in modified heavy marching order. Knapsacks or bedrolls. Please ensure your unit is prepared with one or the other.
9. Any time the Union Division participates in a parade it is considered a somewhat formal affair – ALL Soldiers are to wear white gloves for this event.
10. If a Soldier attends the dance he is to wear as clean a uniform as possible, white gloves and a belt. Swords should not be worn.

11. Morning reports are due through the Brigade Commanders to the Adjutant at 0800 all three days in accordance with Union Division GO #2. If you do not have the forms get with the Adjutant Friday night or first thing Saturday morning.
12. In accordance with ACWS practice there is an ammunition stipend issue at Calico. Stand alone units who field 8 to 14 rifles will receive ten rounds each per day. Units with over 14 rifles will get 20 rounds each day. Unit commanders are responsible for coordinating with the Adjutant for forms and issue times.
13. The official time for the event is located at the Division HQs. Commanders are encouraged to set their time pieces to it so we're all on the same time.
14. The Adjutant is working on the Division Orders of the day for this event and we will get them out to the commanders as soon as they are ready, that way units can formulate their own.

***Lincoln Pilgrimage Parade and Lincoln Shrine Living History Encampment***, Redlands, CA, Feb. 7 -8, 2009. On Saturday we join the Boy Scouts in celebrating President Lincoln's 200<sup>th</sup> birthday with a parade that ends at the Lincoln Shrine, where we provide living history for the rest of Saturday and all day Sunday. Shawn Stidger, the event coordinator, has informed me that due to low response there will NOT be any overnight camping at the Lincoln Shrine.

I will be setting up a fly at the Lincoln Shrine where I will be demonstrating quilting with my hand-crank sewing machine. ACWS Civilians are welcomed to join me. Bring your chair and a sewing or other living history project.

***Calico Civil War Days***, Calico Ghost Town, Feb. 14-16, 2009. Remember you must have a current ACWS membership to be able to participate in this event.

During the Civil War, Valentine cards were flagged with rich colors accompanied by patriotic and/or political motifs. Early American valentine cards were especially

lithographed and hand-colored, beautiful and distinctive in design, produced with intricate lace paper and decorated with such ornaments as beads, sea shells, cones, berries and all manner of seeds and dried and/or artificial flowers. Beginning in the 1840's Valentines were mass produced for sale. During the Civil War mass produced Valentines were in short supply and therefore made by hand. On Saturday, Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> we will recreate the making of Valentines by hand. Bring bits of lace, buttons, crayons, paper, etc. and join us in making Valentines for our sweet hearts.

There will be a variety of other civilian activities including: School house programs, sewing/quilting, Dutch oven cooking, the ACWS Junior Cadet Program, dancing and church services. As I am coordinating the civilian activities at this event, you may contact me if you would like to help with any of these activities.

***12<sup>th</sup> Annual Civil War Reenactment & Living History***, St. Catherine's Military School, Anaheim, CA Feb. 28-Mar. 1, 2009. The unique thing about this event is that the Battle of New Market is reenacted and the students at St. Catherine's Military School honor the young cadets from the Virginia Military Institute who lost their lives in the Civil War. This event is co-sponsored with the Washington Artillery. Paul DeNubilo is the event coordinator. If you wish to participate in this event contact either Paul or myself.

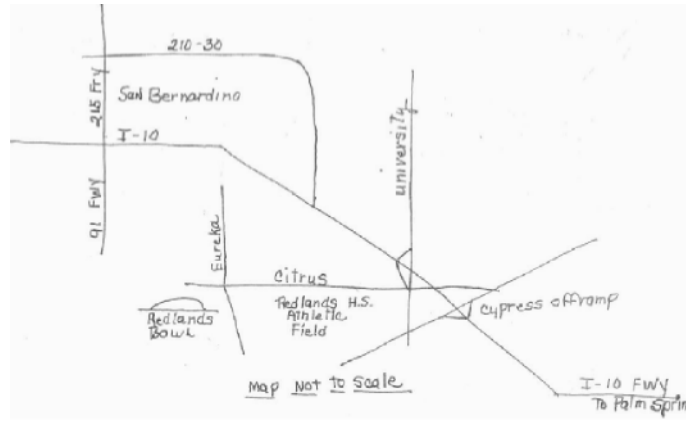

TRAVELING WEST — Exit Interstate 10 at Cypress Off Ramp. Turn left onto Cypress at the Stop sign. The second street to the right is University. Turn right on University. Unload your group at the Redlands High School Athletic Field on the corner of University and Citrus.

## Lincoln and Civil Rights

The second paragraph of the Declaration of Independence states, "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." This was intended to be a narrow vision of Civil Rights which applied to those white, propertied males over the age of 21. Additionally the plight of slavery was struck from the early drafts of the document. It would be four score and seven years until this omission would be corrected.

Abraham Lincoln was born in the slave state of Kentucky on February 12, 1809. He grew up in a poor family and was raised to farm work. His father was in the habit of "renting him out" to other farms for labor. If Lincoln did not hate slavery then he certainly grew to dislike the idea of slavery. He felt it was an outrage that someone worked in the sun all day and someone else would get the money.

From August to October of 1958 Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas engaged in a series of seven debates in which slavery was the main issue, especially the expansion of slavery into the territories. These were issues which divided the nation at the time and fed the paranoid ideas of a Southern conspiracy to spread slavery. Lincoln's ideas, eloquence and popularity during the debates led to his nomination as the Republican Party's choice for President.

One plank in the platform of the newly founded Republican Party was the resolution that slavery would not expand beyond the states in which it already existed. During the election of 1860 Abraham Lincoln led the battle for this idea. The Republican victory in that election resulted in seven Southern states declaring their [secession](#) from the Union even before Lincoln took office on March 4, 1861. Both the outgoing and incoming U.S. administrations rejected

secession, regarding it as [rebellion](#).

In January 1 of 1863 President Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation which declared "that all persons held as slaves" within the rebellious states "are, and henceforward shall be free." The Proclamation had to be spun as a war measure in order to make it palatable to the majority of those in the Northern states who had racist feelings. By the middle of 1863 the war did not bode well for the North and the President had an unsure future for reelection. He was concerned about passing the war to another who would not have the same aims as he. Lincoln invited Frederick Douglass to a White House meeting in August of that year. One topic they discussed was the use agents in the South to encourage slaves to run away from the plantations. Douglas commented, "What he said on this day showed a deeper moral conviction against slavery than I had even seen before in anything spoken or written by him." This tactic was never completed as Sherman made his march to the sea and the tide of war favored the North.

On November 19, 1863 Lincoln stood up and began a speech with these now famous words, "Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal." In that first sentence he harkened back to the second paragraph of the Declaration of Independence. In effect he placed that founding document into the Constitution of the United States and created a new yardstick by which government and people measure themselves.

The Civil War ended on April 9, 1865 and two days later Abraham Lincoln gave his last public speech. He spoke of the difficult road of Reconstruction. He illustrated the work which Louisiana had done to reenter the Union. He also went on record advocating voting rights for African American. John Wilkes Booth was a member of the audience. He vowed, "That is the

last speech he will make." A white supremacist and Confederate activist, Booth made good on his

threat. The President was assassinated three days after that speech was delivered.

The force of Lincoln's dream was felt into the post civil war Reconstruction era. The 13<sup>th</sup> Amendment abolished slavery. The 14<sup>th</sup> Amendment established citizenship for any person born within the United States and provided the guarantees of the Bill of Rights for them. The 15<sup>th</sup> Amendment prohibited each government in the United States to prevent a citizen from voting based on that citizen's race, [color](#), or previous condition of servitude (i.e., slavery.)

Lincoln had the idea that slavery was an unnatural state for the country to tolerate. Legislative material recommending the cessation of slavery were often modified or dropped in order to have a piece of law passed. He also needed to placate the racist North by modifying information to be more palatable and appear to meet their needs. Thus we see his growth from the placid view that slavery would eventually disappear to the development of a "John Brown" mentality to foment slave agitation in the South. Politics and time certainly moved Lincoln along this road.

## History repeats itself during President's Day Weekend at Calico Ghost Town

(December 1, 2008 - San Bernardino, CA) California was not part of the Civil War that tore the country in two in the 1860's. But the American Civil War Society of California and Nevada will bring that piece of history to life at Calico Ghost Town February 14-16, 2009.

No need to drive across the country to Gettysburg, Atlanta or Vicksburg to experience the sounds of volleying cannons and sites of soldiers dressed in the blue and grey uniforms waging war upon each other. Nearly 300 American Civil War Society members will bring the Union and Confederate troops to the streets of Calico Ghost Town and re-live the battles and the way of life for troops from both sides during that time period. President Abraham Lincoln and other brigade commanders will be on hand to inspect the troops!

Visitors will experience the emotions of living under martial law in a town occupied by the Confederate army. Suddenly, cannon fire is heard, smoke covers the air and Union soldiers rush in and a battle ensues. During the three-day weekend visitors will observe drills, troop inspections, cannon demonstrations and fashions of the period. Taking part in a barbeque dinner with Union and Confederate troops, watching dance exhibitions and a cavalcade of horses on the streets of the town are some of the many activities planned for the weekend's events.

## Helpful Hints & Timely Tips

### For Civil War Reenactors

Welcome to Civil War reenacting; a splendid hobby that enables you to indulge your passion for history while giving visitors an experience that will enrich, entertain and enchant.

As most of our dear and gentle friends have come to know, this can be an expensive hobby. Fear not! You can use imagination and resourcefulness to acquire your gear. If those \$200 day dresses and \$600 ball gowns have left you with sticker shock, then this is the web site for you.

We strive to provide useful, practical information--shortcuts for getting started and tips to save time and money. Remember that it takes about a year to get your gear together, so take your time, **do the research first** and get good stuff. That is the best way to save time and money.



## Know Your Role

### Five Tips for selecting and researching a beginning

#### civilian role Tip No. 1 Find a Mentor

Talk with some of the established members. They can help at your first few events by lending you a dress and accessories, sharing tent space or incorporating you into their portrayal for a few events. This is an easy way to learn the ropes until you decide which direction you want to take.

#### Tip No. 2 Keep It Simple and Straight Forward

Before you spend tons of money on clothing and gear, go to a couple of events in a simple role. Test the waters as it were, by portraying a general role such as farm wife. Be a maid or servant to someone with an established role and learn by watching.

#### Tip No. 3

If you have a history in very to supply children have

skill you enjoy and would like to share with others, check out its connection to the Civil War. Do you like to knit? Knitting played a important part as the ladies of the home front kept their needles busy warm socks and gloves to their sons in the army. Many of today's never seen anyone knit. This persona would teach them that once

upon a time socks did not come from Wal-Mart. This tip applies to everything from blacksmithing to quilting.

### **Tip No. 4 Do Lots of Research**

One of the best lines I ever heard at a reenactment was a young lady who said, with a straight face, "I don't want to read history, I just want to live it!" I laughed so hard I nearly burst my corset. After apologizing for laughing, I asked her how she could live history if she didn't know it?

Research is a treasure hunt. It's your job to dig up the gold that you will use to create your persona. Sure you can put on a slat bonnet, grab a basket and be a farm wife; but think how much more you can teach people if you can talk about farm animals, crops, the effects of the weather, the effects of insects on your crops, the effects of the economic times on your farm income. How much milk does it take to make a pound of butter? How much will that pound of butter sell for? How do you get that pound of butter to market? How do you keep it fresh without a refrigerator? How does a butter churn work and what is a butter mold? Do you get to keep the butter and egg money for yourself or does your skinflint husband take it from you? The more background information you have on the character you portray, the more realistic and three-dimensional you will become in your role.

### **Tip No. 5 Read About Social History**

Many long time re-enactors are quick to make remarks that are stereotypical rather than true. A woman was not an old maid if she was unmarried at 18. Not everyone had or wanted a 17" waist. Not everyone was religious. Vice was common and not always illegal. Most people were literate and with much better vocabularies than we use today. Most women worked on farms, in factories or cottage industry. People with slaves or servants were a minority of the population. The North was not a united front. Many Northerners did not support the war and worked to further the Southern cause. Not every Northerner supported or liked President Lincoln. Don't present your persona in a vacuum. Learn some of the social background of the mid Victorian era.

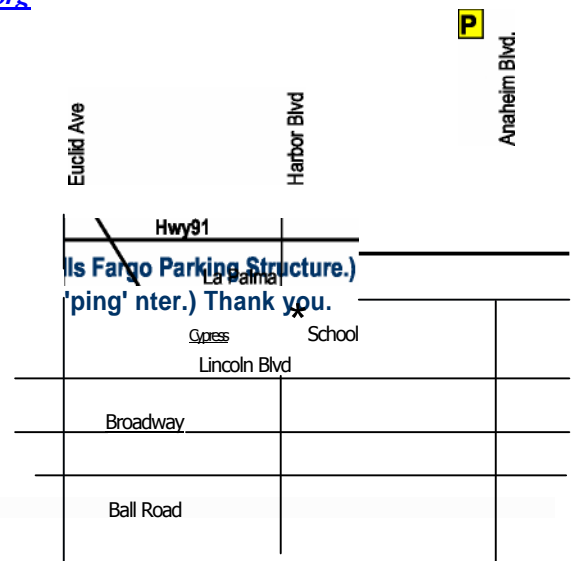

**Parking.** Parking is a chore because St. Cath is in the middle of a residential area. However, off-site parking can be found at the corner of Harbor Blvd & Broadway (Wells Fargo Parking Structure.) South on Harbor, left Broadway OR across from City Hall on Anaheim Blvd. (Parking structure behind Von's Shopping Center.) South on Harbor, left on Lincoln, left on Anaheim.

Do not park behind the Church South of St. Catherine's; they need that for Sunday service.

**Setup.** The area is available from Friday 12:30 for unloading. Use the same spot you had last year. Union in the Quad. and Confederates in the front. Above ground stoves are ok. New units should contact Paul De Nubilo prior to camping.

Limited field camping against the fence opposite the bleachers for Union units with dog tents and bedrolls will be available again this year. The area in front of the backstop will be used for the hospital again.

Any Union units who do not mind being away from the roaming public can camp on the other side of the side walk from the confederate camp out in front.
