Subject: Confederate Command Report

APPOINTMENTS - The following appoints are made for the following positions on the Confederate Division Staff:

Division Quartermaster - Major Raphael Moses (portrayed by Dale Jacobs, Pvt Co A, 17th Virginia). Moses is best known as the chief commissary officer for General James Longstreet, the man General Robert E. Lee called "my old warhorse." Moses assumed this position in November 1862, at the age of fifty, and served at Chickamauga; Second Manassas, Virginia; the first battle of Fredericksburg, Virginia; Gettysburg, Pennsylvania; and the major campaigns around Chattanooga and Knoxville, both in Tennessee. Moses had regular contact with several of the South's most famous generals and was especially close to Robert E. Lee. Moses was with him during the Battle of Gettysburg and, on the evening of the defeat, slept near him on the ground while a heavy storm rained down upon them. Moses was responsible for feeding and supplying up to 54,000 Confederate troops and personnel, and his actions contrasted sharply with the Union policy of looting and burning homes, farms, and entire cities full of defenseless civilians. Moses had been forbidden by Lee to enter private homes in search of supplies during raids into Union territory, even when food was in painfully short supply, and he always paid for what he did take from farms and businesses, albeit in Confederate tender. Moses attended the last meeting of the Confederate government, at the Bank of the State of Georgia (later the Heard House), in Washington in Wilkes County on May 5, 1865. It was there that he carried out the Confederacy's last order. Moses was ordered by Confederate president Jefferson Davis to take possession of \$40,000 in gold and silver bullion from the Confederate treasury and deliver it to help feed and supply the defeated soldiers straggling home after the war. Moses successfully carried out his duty, despite repeated attempts by mobs to take the bullion forcibly.

Division Chaplain – Chaplain William Thomas (portrayed by Mark Schoenberger, AKA 'Cousin' Jasper Stone, Private, Hampton's Legion). Chaplain Thomas enlisted as a Pvt. in Co. C of Hampton's Legion 14 August 1861. Was wounded "slightly" in the neck at the Battle of Seven Pines 31 May 1862, and hospitalized. Wounded again at 2 Manassas 30 Aug. 1862, and hospitalized again. Became acting

Chaplain of Hampton's Legion in June of 1863. Commended for bravery and officially made regimental Chaplain Nov. 1863. Chaplain Thomas was the 4th and last Chaplain for Hampton's Legion. As with most Chaplains, Priests, Rabbis and the like, Chaplain Thomas will hold the rank of Captain, for purposes of Pay and Benefits. Mark Schoenberger, known throughout Southern California Reenacting as "Cousin Jasper", started reenacting with the 8th LA. in the Early 1990's. He became Chaplain while in that unit, and has been an active reenactor ever since. Mark is now with Hampton's Legion portraying Chaplain Thomas.

Other Positions Available -There are a few appointive positions available on Division Staff. Right now am looking for a combination Sergeant Major/Provost. If you are very knowledge of duties at the division level, or willing to learn, see me at a future event. You can be infantry, cavalry, or artillery oriented. Old veteran or young knowledgeable recruit.

RULES/POLICIES REMINDERS/IMPLEMENTATION - Rule 3.3.2.of the ACWS rules deal with authenticity. Most all units that participate at ACWS events have a similar rule. Noticed at the Calico event some items that need to be looked at.

Distaff Soldiers - Rule 3.3.2.3 of the ACWS rules encourages women to portray soldiers as well as portraying documented Vivandiere/Cantinierre impressions. The rule also includes the dreaded 'Five – Foot Rule,' in that at a distance of five (5) foot or greater, the average spectator should be unable to distinguish a male soldier from a female soldier. Many of us do outfit a 'woman' to fight and I don't have an issue with her looking 'girly,' the first time she goes out. But, sometimes there is a but, if she joins up, 'man' her up. Also, don't wear items with straps that 'cross the heart.' IF found out that you are a 'distaff' soldier, be prepared to be Court Martialed and drummed out camp. Which you can come back into at night and we start all over again.

Wearing of 'under drawers' - Observed the wearing of 'one's 'under drawers.' During scenarios (battles) don't have a problem as if one is in Pennsylvania in July, and firing a cannon, would guess there would be some 'stripping down' to keep a bit cooler. But, don't walk around camp/event site that way. Put on your shirt and/or jacket.

Tattoos - many of us have tattoos. Tattoos are period for the Civil War, but (sometimes there is a but) most all 'modern' tattoos are not period correct. Try and keep them covered

Ear Piercing - some of us have ear and other body parts piercings. Piercing was not a 'normal' period activity. Please remove or attempt to cover up.

DIVINE INTERVENTION? - The annual ACWS Raffle was held at Calico. Any member of the ACWS that participated at an event on the Confederate side (Union too) was awarded a single ticket for each day they attended (this based on morning reports submitted by your company 1st Sergeants to Division Adjutant. IF they were not submitted, you don't get credit for attending). As many of us know, Rev Roger Hurley attended a number of ACWS events last year until his early passing. A number of memorials were held at different events. One was held on Saturday at Calico. After the second battle on Sunday, we drew tickets. All the tickets were mixed up by two different people AND we had an uninterested third party, of the ripe young age of about 3 pull the winning ticket. Yup, Roger won the raffle prized (\$600). Could some type of divine intervention have had occurred? I took the prize up to the Union Camp, where Mrs. Hurley was encamped and presented it to her. Tears were in her eyes and she commented that now they family has more money to permit them to go to Gettysburg this year.

NEW CONFEDERATE RAFFLE TICKET POLICY - As noted in the previous article, members earn raffle tickets at events that are sponsored or co-sponsored by the ACWS. We now have an event that is 'three-days' long, Calico. To recognize and thank those members of the ACWS that stay over for the third day, they will be issued two tickets if they attend the event on Monday. Also, if there is an event that comes up in the future where there is a 'school day' on Friday or another event with battles on Monday (possibly Vail Lake in May) two tickets will be provided to those that come out on those days. I am working on policy change on the Confederate side in which if there is an event that is 'supported' by the ACWS (Ft Tejon Invitational, Prado, etc.) and if the ACWS Battalions (Artillery, Cavalry, Infantry) are allowed to fight as a Battalion under their normal commanders, members would also be awarded a ticket for each day they are there. Will be working with overall Confederate Commanders at these events to see they are agreeable that the ACWS Battalions can fight as a group under their commanders (Major Collins, LC Peca, and Major Stytle). More on this at a future date.



LOST AND FOUND - At the Calico event, found, two items - One on the dance floor after the dance on Saturday night and one in/near the street near the Confederate Camp (near 8th La Camp). IF you think these are yours, let me know. I will try and remember and bring them to St Cat's or Prado.

FUTURE EVENTS

March 16-17 - St Cat's – 15th annual event in Anaheim. Mostly living history and answering questions from students from St Cat's and surrounding School Districts. If your unit is anticipating on attending, send me 4 or 5 questions about your unit or state so I can get them added to the

Q&A that is handed out to students attending the event. See article from the Washington Artillery, dealing with activities elsewhere in the newsletter. Location: St. Catherine's School (250 N Harbor Blvd., Anaheim, CA). It has been great to be a part of the learning experience of such a fine group of boys and their teachers! Early Friday set up after 12 noon is permitted the gates open to the public 0900 hrs on Saturday and Sunday. Battles are scheduled at 1100 and 1400 hrs each day. Camping layout will be the same as last year. Union in the quad and on the field. Confederates on the front lawn. Saturday night raffle and Chili dinner. H'burgers and hot dogs will be on sale by the school for lunch. Restaurants also very

March 16-17 - Picacho Peak, Arizona Territory. Tom Atkins (Co E, 8th La) usually goes and commands a consolidated Confederate unit from South California. Here you can wear your 'yahoo' clothing. 2ND KENTUCKY VOLUNTEER CAVALRY REGIMENT, CSA A SHORT HISTORY



Regimental colors of the 2nd Kentucky Cavalry. It was later used by General Basil Duke as the flag of Morgan's Brigade. It was given to Morgan's mother, Henrietta Morgan, after Duke's surrender in Georgia in May, 1865 and was cherished by her until her death in 1891. The flag is now part of the collection of the Filson Club in Louisville, KY. Hoist: 30"; Canton 19" x 19"; 14 Stars, including a KY Star Colors: Stars are white on a blue canton; the outer bars are red, separated by a white center bar. The flag is silk with a silk tape border, and was attached to the pole by two pairs of ties of white silk in gold cord intermixed.

The Second Kentucky Cavalry regiment was formed from the remnants of John Hunt Morgan's cavalry squadron, "The Lexington Rifles" soon after the battle of Shiloh, in early 1862. A native of Alabama, but raised in Kentucky, Morgan was a tall, glamorously attired cavalry officer with French imperial-styled whiskers. His penchant for good Kentucky horseflesh kept him well mounted throughout the war. The Second Kentucky's ranks included farmers, planters, and the First Families of Kentucky, but also a colorful cast of characters. A fiery British soldier-of- fortune, Lt. Col. George St. Leger Grenfell declared, "If England is not at war, then I will go find one!" A wily Canadian-born telegraph operator, Pvt. George "Lightning" Ellsworth could, after moments of listening in, mimic any operators style (hand) and thus mislead pursuing forces. Muster sheets included a band of Kentucky outlaws led by the notorious bushwacker, Capt. Champ Ferguson. Also reported among the Second Kentucky's ranks were Black Mississippi Confederates whom were recruited by John Hunt Morgan, as he felt they were "loyal and fierce fighters". This cavalry unit was noted for being as good fighting dismounted as they were on horseback. The Second Kentucky was most noted for its skill at house-to-house fighting, discipline under fire, and maintaining rearguard actions. John Hunt Morgan would always affectionately regard them as his "Regulars". Morgan's famous Ohio Raid of July 1863 was the longest Confederate cavalry raid of the war, covering more than 1100 miles in about three and a half weeks. However, on this foray, he and most of his

troopers were surrounded and captured. Morgan was imprisoned in the Ohio State Penitentiary. Not long after being locked away, he and some accomplices tunneled out and escaped back to Dixie. It was the Second Kentucky, attached to General Nathan Bedford Forrest that fired the opening and closing shots of the battle of Chickamauga. As the war came to a close the Second Kentucky (re-designated as the Second Kentucky Special Cavalry Battalion) attempted to link up with Gen. Robert E. Lee. In route, and upon hearing of Lee's surrender, the command instead went to Charlotte, North Carolina, joining Gen. Joseph E. Johnston's army. While Johnston negotiated surrender with Gen. Sherman, the command elected to join President Jefferson Davis, thus making up the bulk of Davis', (along with the Confederate Treasury's gold) mounted escort. As Federal forces were closing in, Davis dismissed his escort and continued on with a small bodyguard detachment. Upon Davis' capture, it was discovered that 11 of the 12 troopers in his bodyguard were of the Second Kentucky. During its four years of service, the 2nd Kentucky Cavalry, of which General John Hunt Morgan was the first Colonel, lost sixty-three commissioned officers killed and wounded; Company A of that regiment, of which Morgan was the first Captain, losing during the war seventy-five men killed. It had on its muster roll, from first to last, nearly two hundred-and-fifty men (not sure if this is for Company A or the Regiment as a whole, am guessing most likely Company A).

As you know, ACWS events are dog-friendly, and many of you are acquainted with Valkyrie Atkins, Maggie Akkerman, and Biscuit Akkerman who comprise our unofficial “Canine Corps.” Just as many people today enjoy the company of pets, Civil War soldiers also found comfort in the friendship they give. Often pets were adopted by entire regiments as mascots. These ranged from a tame black bear to an eagle. During the Maryland Campaign at least three dogs accompanied regiments of the Army of the Potomac as mascots.

The 11th Pennsylvania Volunteers of the First Corps marched through Maryland along with Sallie, a brindle bull terrier given to the regiment in 1861. During battle Sallie could be found on the front line of the regiment providing encouragement to the men, and barking at the Confederates. This she did on September 14 at Turner’s Gap in South Mountain and again on September 17 at Antietam. Sallie survived both battles without harm. Sallie was killed in action by a Rebel bullet at Hatcher’s Run on February 6, 1865.

Another Pennsylvania regiment, the 102nd Volunteers of Couch’s Division of the 4th Corps, was accompanied by Jack, a black and white bull terrier. Before the war Jack was the mascot of the Niagara Volunteer Fire Company, and when these men enlisted in the army, they brought Jack along. Earlier in 1862 he had been “captured” at Savage Station, but escaped, only to be wounded at Malvern Hill. Jack is reported to have understood the bugle call of his regiment, and at the battle of Antietam his barking was heard above the sound of battle. After the battle he aided with searching out the dead and wounded of his regiment. Following the Maryland Campaign, Jack was wounded twice and captured once again, later being “exchanged” to remain with the 102nd until December, 1864.

Perhaps the most dramatic story of a mascot involves the 6th Wisconsin, the famous “Iron Brigade.” During the summer of 1862 a Newfoundland wandered into camp and was befriended by Captain Werner von Bachelle, who taught him to perform military salutes. At the battle of South Mountain the dog was at his side. In the early morning fighting at Antietam, von Bachelle was struck by several Confederate bullets while leading his Company into battle. Knowing his wounds were mortal, von Bachelle lay in the roadway while his company withdrew.

However, his trusted canine friend refused to withdraw, and remained with him as the Rebels advanced. After the battle, a burial detail found von Bachelle’s body, the Newfoundland who refused to give ground lying dead on top of him. They were buried together with full military honors.
